



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PETROLIA-MATE LONGAGO

The city issued the occupancy permit in 1967 and at that time Mac Dougall Construction built Safeway, the strip mall and the gas station. It was called Petrolia Mall and the district had been named Greenfield. Before the district obtained that name it was called Home Gardens and McNamara Estates. I presume these names were used by real estate agents and developers before the city gave it the official name.

Safeway was the anchor store and there were also a variety of stores and services in the mall. Safeway sold groceries but also had a bakery and a meat section. A lunch counter was at the west end of the store just past the bakery. Mix and matched chocolate creams were at the east end and you could fill an available bag; a big

attraction for kids and those with a sweet tooth.

Award Meats was a popular butcher shop and
Sprague Drugs was a necessary addition. Penny
Carey, who always had a smile and a welcoming word
for everyone, came in 1972 to be the pharmacist.

Penny managed the store for many years and still
lives in Greenfield.

The barber shop was run by Ben and his wife, but when he became the winner of a large amount of money from a lottery ticket, they were gone and into a more leisurely life. The beauty shop could be accessed from the mall or from the back entrance.

Other businesses were the Bank of Montreal, a hardware store, a fabric store, a dry cleaner, a shoe repair kiosk, and a fast food restaurant called Hannigan's which was located at the west end of the mall. It had orange booths and served burgers, fries and Chinese food.

The most important store for the children was Q-Mart. It was entranced from the mall or the back door which I mentioned earlier. At that time there was a back entrance from the lane and the kids would park their bikes there, enter Q-Mart to play pinball and buy candy. The best game to play was pinball football because it was the best one to win free games. Can you believe that Mojo's were two for a cent? For kids this store was their own paradise.

Since 1967 many changes have taken place at the mall and even the name has changed. In the olden days everytime we went to shop we were bound to meet neighbors and friends from Greenfield. All those wonderful and varied stores are now only memories. Time marches on.



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
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
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What is Front Yards in Bloom?

Avoid using pesticides and herbicides in your garden as they can harm bees and pollinators. Provide a water source for bees, such as a shallow bird bath with rocks or twigs to prevent them from drowning.
