A Stranger's Small Gesture Makes a Big Impact

A Story from Our Community League President



This is Lambie. If you have met my daughter in the last five years, there is a good chance you've met Lambie. Lambie goes everywhere. Lambie has near perfect attendance in school, she is a regular at soccer practice, drama class and piano lessons. In the last few years, Lambie has been to Europe, northern Manitoba and the West Coast. And I bring

her up because one night a few weeks ago, we couldn't find Lambie.

A house to car and back again search led us to realize that she had definitely GONE to drama class, but she did not come home. So there I was, outside the Citadel theatre at nine o'clock the next morning, desperately waiting to be able to search the classrooms in the hopes of finding her, when I happened to glanced down the street. There was Lambie. Safely propped in the branches of a tree lining the street, off the cobblestones, out of the frost, and easy to be seen by a searching parent. That is not where we left Lambie. My daughter must have dropped her on the street getting into the car.

A stranger had seen her, noticed her, and taken the time to move her to safety hoping that someone would come back for her. We won the lottery with that stranger. That tiny act, saving a well-loved stuffed animal and placing her safely out of the way to be found made my daughter's year. The action took less than ten seconds but the kindness of seeing a toy, using their empathy and imagination to consider that that toy could be valuable in all the best ways, and then deciding to act – meant everything to our family.

They could have walked by. But they stopped. Took the time. I've seen these moments called "glimmers" recently – and I like that term. Not showy, or flashy, nor life changing, but moments that shimmer in the darkness. Ordinary moments made better by kindness and warmth. Choosing to act when there is no tangible reward.

We are so busy. Inflation is high, safety less certain, public issues complex and fraught with consequences that are hard to map out by experts, let alone ordinary people. We are armchair warriors limited by budget, by feeling inadequate in parsing out multi-layered issues with deep consequences, by an overwhelming array of causes that need our help. And none of these challenges are changed by glimmers, glimmers don't solve anything – but they can make ordinary days - well, better.

At the end of the day, it isn't the fireworks or the trophies that make our community amazing. It is these small moments that make our community such a wonderful place to be. As we enter the season of lights in the darkness, I wish you many glimmers – moments that connect you to your family and friends, to your neighbours and to strangers alike. Moments that shine softly in the winter air. Candles in the window.

And on the off change to the stranger who chose kindness and saved Lambie sees this – thank you from the bottom of an 11 year old's heart.

taught at the school across the street. The Chapel, while the building of the church was going on, offered weekday daily mass for the parishioners. Many baptisms and marriages were celebrated in the chapel.

Greenfield History, Art & Culture

Another piece of history soon to be gone.

Old Daughters of Wisdom Convent

The community of Greenfield is about to physically lose the building at 3820-114 St. It has stood on that spot for 55 years! Another piece of history soon to be gone.

The origin on the building

The religious order of nuns, Daughters of Wisdom, needed to have a residence in Edmonton as their provincial headquarters. With Imperial Real Estate Agents' help they found two lots in Petrolia. They were advised to buy three lots. The site had great advantages as it was across from St. Stanislaus School and across from the site of the future St Thomas More Church.

Advantages also were: it was walking distance to the shopping centre, the bank, the bus stop, a medical/dental clinic, and a pharmacy. Except for the bank, these things are still advantages today.

They purchased the three lots and obtained a building permit from the City Council. The site had to be rezoned for a three family dwelling in a two family zone. At the time it was considered an exorbitant amount but all acknowledged that it was a reasonable price. I couldn't find the dollar figure.

Then they hired Bouey and Bouey Architects for design and Vetsch Brothers Construction to build it. The money to build was borrowed from the Royal Bank.

Construction started in September 1967. The sisters moved in August 1968.

Immediately the convent became a hub of activity for the order. This Edmonton Residence became their provincial headquarters.

It also serviced the Greenfield community. Sisters

Daughters of Wisdom operated many missions. But closest to their heart was the care offered to refugees, the boat people. The sisters looked after the refugees immediate needs when they came to the city. Then they cared for special needs once they were settled. The Parish, in community spirit, assisted with this.

As the years went by, the number of sisters in the Province diminished. With fewer Daughters of Wisdom sisters living in Edmonton and many of them retiring, the convent building became too large for their needs. So the decision was made to sell the building.

A new owner takes over

The building was sold to Shepherd's Care Foundation and they opened a dementia care residence in 2006. One advantage the old convent had was an inner courtyard completely enclosed by the building. Residents could be outside and there was no exit that would allow them to wander away from the building.

Shepherd's Care Foundation renovated the building to accommodate 30 dementia care units. Once established they offered many programs for their residents.

Sadly the building now needs many costly renovations to keep it up to city code. The cost of renovations is prohibitive. So a new owner was found.

The residents are being rehoused at three other locations and when this is completed the building will pass to the new owner.

Good bye to an old friend. The new owner plans demolition. What will start the next chapter at 3820-114 St.?




